

Elder Pastoral Group:

A Message from the Manse

Dear friends,

It was 15 months ago when I last wrote about Communion, sharing with you the reasons why the Kirk Session had postponed celebrating the sacrament until as many as possible could be physically present. We drew upon Paul's writing, where he said five times, 'when you come together...', and that the Lord's Supper makes the many one: 'one loaf...one body' (1 Corinthians 10:17). As a writer put it at the time, Communion "gathers up the many who partake of the same elements together, in the same place, and makes them one."

Since that time, we've seen many changes and faced many seasons – didn't we all think this would be over by last autumn? I know I surely did! However, things are now definitely beginning to progress towards some form of normality. As such, the Kirk Session have agreed to hold Communion services on Thursday 2nd September 11.30am and Sunday 5th September 11am (with a short post-service Communion for our Sunday School teams). By that stage, we anticipate there will be no social distancing requirements and that all groups for children and young people will have recommenced, and so the vast majority of our congregation can attend once more, if they feel able. Also, there is no need to book ahead of time, so you can simply turn up on the day again.

I do hope you'll join us! I'm aware that coming back after so long away can be daunting (and the comfy home pew on the couch does beat the wooden ones!), and who can deny that singing with face masks isn't a little bit frustrating? Nevertheless, I encourage you to try it, brothers and sisters, for the vast majority have found the experience to be encouraging and uplifting, for being physically present with the church family makes a huge difference!

I would also like to highlight the upcoming season of giving from 5th September to 31st October – for those receiving a paper copy of Bright Lights, you will have received a giving envelope in relation to this. As a later article by our Treasurer outlines, the Church of Scotland is giving congregations an opportunity to hold a "giving day" during the dates above. However, due to other commitments within Brightons, we didn't feel it was appropriate to have another Sunday so focused on giving, and as such there is simply a period of time to give towards this initiative. Do note, that all giving in this time remains with the local congregation and is not counted towards our Ministry and Mission giving (which supports my stipend and the wider work of our denomination). Please prayerfully consider what you can give, as this is a unique opportunity to support the life and ministry of our congregation.

Lastly, I'm aware that I haven't been able to fulfil my hope of visiting over the summer — between an adverse reaction throughout June to my first vaccination, then 10 days of self-isolation, I'm afraid I had to change my aspirations. And maybe there is something in that for us all? As Ecclesiastes reminds us, 'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens...' (Ecc. 3:1) Sometimes we need to hold our plans, our wishes, our preferences more lightly than we previously did, and reconcile ourselves to changed circumstances. Where do you need to do that? Is it in relation to how church — or Sunday worship — is done? Is it in relation to your finances — giving something up so others can benefit?

I pray the Lord might generously pour His grace upon us that we might fulfil His call and purposes in this time and in this season. I do hope you'll join us.

The Pastoral Assistant's Message



The pandemic has caused the church to re-examine the way she serves the community of believers. Ministers, Elders and Teams are trying to figure out the right course to chart in uncertain times. God reminds us that He is the Rock, and if we build his church on His Word, we will make it.

How many times have you heard, "I wish things would return to normal"? It is becoming more apparent that things will not return to "normal" for some time, and maybe that is a good thing. For too long, the church has operated the same way week after week, with little deviation or room for the Holy Spirit to move. The church is broken, and God is calling her back to centre again on Him.

We need to take time in prayer focusing on what God wants for the church and what He wants for his people. It can be seen as an opportunity not to be lost in the rules and regulations of our government. While you cannot control what is happening in society, you can control what happens in your soul. A time of intentional prayer will recentre the church back on Christ and prepare the way for the future.

Like sheep, our members have become scattered. Some have disconnected from being a part of the church. Groups and their activities had once attracted these members to attend, but today, they are seen as a threat to their health, if they gather in large numbers. The fear of catching COVID-19, and the time lapse during the lockdown measures have lured once faithful people to stay away. People want to feel connected. For months many have been isolated from family, friends, and routines. The church has an opportunity to fill the void, by reconnecting with the disconnected. Telephone calls, text messages, social media touchpoints, and old fashion snail mail are still required and can make people feel that they are a part of something greater than themselves.

If you have learned anything over the last eighteen months, it should be to be adaptable. By now, you realise that you cannot control what is happening to you, but you can control how you react to the prescribed changes. The rapid rate of change should be seen as an opportunity - and a chance to evaluate

grow deeper with God. For too many churches, things have become idols and have taken away from the valid reason people come to church. Use this time to change the old ways of having church. Do not be constrained by the past but adapt to the present situation and needs of the church even if it is live streaming, DVD and CD media or listening on the telephone.

Yes, Church will be different and may never be the same as you remember it but God's people will be the same. As you think about "dipping your toe in the water again" the continued wearing of a mask in church even when singing may still be difficult, getting to church may now require transport, you may have become used to the "comfy pew" of home church but do try to come back with us. On Thursday 2nd September at 11.30am there will be a short Communion service you may wish to think about. Contact me on 01324 719641 to discuss your concerns or needs.

Be encouraged - God is still on the throne, and He will work this out for the good of the church if the church is willing to do it's part in building the kingdom.

Life and Work Sunday 29 August 2021

Life and Work has been informing, uplifting, moving, connecting and occasionally enraging the Church of Scotland for over 140 years. This summer, we are offering churches the chance to celebrate that.

The magazine was founded in 1879 by Archibald Charteris, who had identified that there was a demand for a distinctively Scottish Christian magazine for ministers to circulate in their parishes. He established the template that in many ways remains to this day: news of the Church at local, national and international level, commentary on the key issues of the day from a Scottish Christian perspective, spiritual guidance and Bible study, interviews and profiles of key figures within the Church.

Later editors would recall that the new publication faced scepticism and even ridicule from elements of the Church establishment, but distributed through the parish churches with a supplement for local news, Life and Work quickly became part of the furniture and – with the exception of a two-month break because of a printer's strike in 1959 – it has published monthly ever since – even, more recently during the Covid-19 global pandemic.

At the Union with the United Free Church in 1929 it became 'Life and Work: the Record of the Church of Scotland', and with the coming of the internet acquired an online presence, www.lifeandwork.org You can now also read the whole magazine in digital form which also helps the Church of Scotland move to Net Zero position over the next decade (meaning greenhouses gases are equivalent to those taken away).

But however you choose to read, Life and Work remains an essential news source and platform for discussion for the whole Church.

What is Alpha 🧈

Alpha is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. Alpha is run all around the globe, and everyone's welcome. It runs in cafés, churches, universities, homes—you name it. No two Alphas look the same, but generally they have three key things in common: food, a talk and good conversation.

Food: Whether it's a group of friends gathered around a kitchen table, or a quick catch up over coffee and cake, food has a way of bringing people together. It's no different at Alpha. Most sessions start with food because it's a great way to build community and get to know each other.

Talks: The talks are designed to engage and inspire conversation. Usually around thirty minutes long and delivered over a few weeks, they can be given as a live talk or played as a video. They explore the big issues around faith and unpack the basics of Christianity, addressing questions from *Who is Jesus?* and *How can we have faith?* to *Why and how do I pray?* and *How does God guide us?*



Conversation: Probably the most important part of any Alpha: the chance to share thoughts and ideas on the topic, and simply discuss it in a group. There's no obligation to say anything and there's nothing you can't say (seriously). It's an opportunity to hear from others and contribute your own perspective in an honest, friendly and open environment.

Finance Update

The year continues to be a very extraordinary time for us all and it is most heartening to see your continuing financial support.

The following summary reflects the position at the end of July.

Our overall expenditure to date is £3,000 less than the budget. The heat and light costs saving is almost £1,500. The property budget is also lower than budget as repairs are currently restricted to maintaining the building wind and water tight.

National Giving Day - All Church of Scotland congregations have been encouraged by this year's General Assembly to take part in a Church-wide National Giving Day over the season of Harvest between 5th September and 31st October.

The money raised through this National Giving Day **will not** be assessable for Ministries and Mission purposes. All monies raised will stay with the local church and none of it will be passed to '121'. If a donor wishes their gift to be used for a specific purpose, we will respect that request. For gifts with no identified specific purpose then the Deacons' Court / Kirk Session will be able to choose how to use the money, provided that it will be used in line with the charitable objectives of the church.

A special envelope is provided so that we can show all the gifts were given as part of this initiative. The special envelopes are included with the paper copies of Bright Lights and will also be available on a Sunday or by contacting the Treasurer. Gifts can also be made by popping them in an envelope and clearly identifying it is for the National Giving Day and bringing them on a Sunday or using the secure post box at the halls entrance.


This initiative will give all of us, of all ages an opportunity to reflect on God's presence with us and to offer a gift of thanksgiving to God.



Christians Against Poverty (CAP)

A Message from Sandra and Graham Duncan, South Africa

Recent news from South Africa has been very concerning. There has been a big surge in Coronovirus infections, so it was good to hear that Graham and Sandra have both been able to have their second jabs. However, there are many people yet to be vaccinated and vaccines are in short supply.

There has also been considerable unrest and violence by supporters of former president Jacob Zuma, who was recently imprisoned for failing to comply with a court order. Graham and Sandra have sent us an article by Clem Sunter which helps to explain what is happening in the country, summarised below. Please keep the nation of South Africa in your prayers.

Following the 1994 democratic elections in South Africa, South Africa did really well economically until about 2008, which was the year Jacob Zuma was elected president of the ANC, since when there has been an increase in corruption and a weakening of government institutions. A stupendous sum of money was stolen during those years, which this country certainly cannot afford. Eventually however the internal tide within the ANC started to turn against Jacob Zuma, and in December 2017 Cyril Ramaphosa was elected as the president of the ANC and subsequently became the president of South Africa by a narrow margin. He has been determined to clean up the corruption we have seen since 2008 and established a commission to investigate and expose corruption issues.

Jacob Zuma refused to appear in front of the commission even when ordered to do so by the Constitutional Court, which then ordered his imprisonment for a period of 15 months for contempt of court. Initially there was resistance to imprisonment by Jacob Zuma and his supporters, but a few weeks ago Jacob Zuma submitted himself to imprisonment. And then all hell broke loose.

The riots have been at their worst in KwaZulu Natal, which is the region where Jacob Zuma has his powerbase, This is also, as the name will tell you, the home territory of the Zulu nation. Within the Jacob Zuma camp, individuals set about instigating the so-called protests, riots and looting that you have seen in the media, using the existing problems of poverty and inequality to inflame the situation. In addition to that there are the existing fissures along race lines that exist in our society which were also available to leverage. Audio files doing the rounds encouraged people to attack and destroy what are perceived to be white and white owned businesses. In the end though, many black businesspeople also suffered considerable losses.

The gameplan was to create a situation which would force the hand of the current government, resulting in an overreaction by the security forces, which could have led to the deaths of many. If that had occurred, it might have forced the resignation or removal of Cyril Ramaphosa as president. This is one reason why the security forces have been so careful not to use excessive force in dealing with the riots and the looters.

While there is still a lot of instability in KwaZulu Natal and certain pockets in Gauteng, what is now starting to emerge quite clearly is that the gambit by the Jacob Zuma camp has failed. South African society of all walks has turned its face against this insurrection. In effect, an attempted coup has failed.

South Africa is a strange nation in many ways. They argue and fight amongst themselves, but when pushed to the edge, they always pull together for the common good. This has happened again and again over the decades. This has been perhaps a necessary test of our democracy and of the rule of law.
