Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session and the Deacons' Court are the Charity Trustees. The Kirk Session is chaired by the minister and its members are the Elders of the church who are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The Deacons' Court is appointed from within the congregation and members of the congregation are invited to nominate individuals who are believed to have the skills and commitment to contribute to the management affairs of the Church, to become members of the Deacons' Court. Deacons' Court Members are then appointed at the Stated Annual Meeting and serve for a period of three years after which they must seek re-election at the next Stated Annual Meeting.

New trustees are given an induction by the Minister and Clerk to the Deacons' Court, as well as being required to undergo Trustee Safeguarding Training so that they understand their responsibilities for Safeguarding. Opportunities to ask questions, see past minutes and review the latest accounts are also given.

Organisational Structure

The Church operates under the Model Deed of Constitution. The Deacons' Court is chaired by the minister and meets six times in a year. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Finance Committee and the Property Committee as appropriate. The Kirk Session which meets seven times a year is responsible for spiritual affairs within the church.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Activities for the congregation as a whole

Church Life has adapted to changes following the COVID-19 pandemic and full programs are now being offered in most areas.

Attendance in person at Sunday morning worship is slightly lower than pre-pandemic, with a small number of members still not feeling confident to return to the Sanctuary for in-person worship. However, as a church family, we have been encouraged by a number of new members and non-members who attend the services regularly. Morning services continue to be 'live-streamed' from the Sanctuary, with a significant number of views both at the time of morning worship, and over the following week. All-age communion is now a regular feature with two of our quarterly communion services being all-age.

Monthly Sunday evening services (with communion) and monthly half-hour Thursday services (with communion four times a year) are also held, meeting the needs of a number of our church family.

During the summer, a short 30-minute all-age service was again held in the Sanctuary, early on a Sunday morning before the normal 11am service, to allow a space for families to worship together.

It is important to note the effort, from the Minister and many volunteers from our church family, who are involved in these services, giving significant amounts of their time and gifts to ensure worship is meaningful and runs smoothly. Indeed, with the increasing breadth of worship services and events and people involved in these, the 'Worship Team' within our Team structure of the Kirk Session has been reinstated.

Church Life continues to be busy with many life-giving activities being offered through the week including Sunday School and Young People Groups, Pre-5s, Girls' Brigade, Boys' Brigade, Fellowship Groups, Book Groups, Alpha, Art Group. 'Friends of Jesus' Group for adults with learning difficulties, Thursday coffee morning, Guild, Belong and Friendship Plus. These are all run by volunteers from our church family and are valued by so many.

Committees and boards of the church

During the year, the Kirk Session and Deacons' Court discussed and progressed a number of significant issues.

Kirk Session was consulted on various discussion questions proposed from each of the Pastoral Care, Discipleship, Outreach and Up and Coming Teams set up within the Kirk Session structure.

A key focus continued to be progressing the Presbytery Mission Plan for the Upper Braes area, as we informally worked through aspects of a Basis of Union, to help speed up the process when the time arrives to formally agree a Basis. This work paused mid-year as the Presbytery Mission Plan was redrafted and will resume once the draft plan has been agreed.

As part of the pre-work to the Union we communicated with a number of members that had not been to an inperson service for a while to invite them back to church and confirm if they still wished to be members. This resulted both in a number of members resuming worship, and a number receiving their Certificates of Transference, with the Congregational Roll being updated to reflect these changes.

Property

During 2023 all planned maintenance projects continued to be on a "wind and watertight" basis while the Presbytery Planning process continued. Recognition of this has been made in the accounts with acknowledgement that certain deferred property work remains on the horizon.

Achievements and Performance

2023 has been a year of Brightons growing in Discipleship and Prayer. The 'Huddle' groups that started in 2021 and 2022 meet regularly to support one another as they continue in their journey of faith. A small group successfully trialled a discipleship program called 'Safar' and an invitation has now been offered to the rest of the church family to work through these discipleship materials in pairs.

Fellowship and book groups continue to be valued with two new book groups launching, providing exciting opportunities to explore God's Word together.

Prayer ministry and sharing of testimonies have become a regular part of morning and evening worship, encouraging our church family to step out in faith and minister to each other. Congregational prayer times before the morning service are well attended and uplifting.

A number of members were also invited to test out a preaching gift, following a pilot training course run by the Minister and a retired Minister. This has enabled the Preaching Team to expand, which will be helpful going into the Union.

A key achievement in the life of Brightons was the launch of a Youth Worker Appeal, at the end of 2023, to ask our church family to prayerfully and financially support the recruitment of a youth worker to expand our ministry to young people in the Upper Braes that they may find life in all its fullness through Jesus. This is an exciting opportunity for the Upper Braes churches to engage with as we move into 2024.

Risks to the charity

As Brightons depends heavily on volunteers from within the congregation there continues to be the very real risk that some will feel unable to continue. The encouragement to new and long-term members to be an active part of the family of God at Brightons is woven into the life and preaching and during 2023 we continued to see a number of new volunteers coming forward into leadership and support roles, for which we thank God.

With an ageing church family there is an increasing need to provide more pastoral support, beyond that which can realistically be provided by the Pastoral Assistant and Minister. There is a risk we don't have sufficient volunteers to continue to meet this increased support.

With all this in mind, we continue to give thanks to God for the life of Brightons Parish Church family as we prayerfully look forward to 2024.

Financial Review

The financial performance of the charity in the year to 31 December 2023 remained satisfactory. Total income of £184k (2022 £181k) was in line with that of 2022. The majority of income is from congregational donations.

Total costs of charitable activities (excluding the Manse Purchase) of £166.4k were in line with 2022.

During 2022 a new Manse was purchased for the benefit of the Congregation by the Church of Scotland General Trustees and the total purchase cost of £350,000, together with ancillary costs of £10,857 were funded by the congregation. During 2023 costs of £8,947 were incurred relating to the manse move.

The sale of the old manse was successfully concluded in February 2024. All accounting entries relating to this will be reflected in the 2024 accounts.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of at least six months' expenditure including designated funds.

At the year end, the Church held unrestricted funds of £159,282 of which £4,082 has been designated as a Fabric Fund, £9,225 for use by the various organisations and £20,000 for future projects on Youth Work and Church Masonry work. The remaining balance of £125,975 represents about 9 months expenditure which the Trustees consider is a reasonable amount to ensure the ongoing work of the congregation.

The Church also held £57,193 of restricted funds, which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 15. Endowment Funds of £33,756 were held, of which £15,000 must be retained. The balance can be used as Trustees determine.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in operational existence.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Report of the Independent Examiner

I report on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 December 2023 which are set out on pages 9 to 20.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The Charity's Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts under section 44(1)(c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from the Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102)" (effective 1st January 2019), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS102.

The accounts are prepared in Sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of investments at fair value.

Funds

Funds are classified as either restricted funds, endowment funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income therefrom is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming resources

All donations, gifts and legacies are recognised within Incoming Resources under either unrestricted or restricted funds according to the terms under which the income is received. The income is only recognised when the charity is entitled to control the economic benefits expected to flow from the income, it is probable that such benefits will be received and the income can be measured reliably along with any costs to complete the transaction. Donated goods, facilities and services are recognised when the charity is entitled to control the economic benefits expected to flow from the item, it is probable such benefits will be received and the fair value of the donated item can be measured reliably.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as the liability is incurred.

Tangible fixed assets

During 2011, the Trustees received confirmation that, unlike most Church of Scotland congregations, the titles of the Church, Halls and Manse were not vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees, but rather in the Session of Brightons Parish Church. As such, the properties were incorporated into the accounts; the Manse at the 2011, existing use valuation, the Church and Halls at £nil since, given the nature and use of the Church and Halls, no appropriate valuation was available. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

During 2022, a new Manse was purchased however this is vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. As such, this has not been recognised as an asset within Brightons Parish Church accounts.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £3,000 having a value to the charity greater than one year, other than those acquired for specific purposes, are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives:

Non-residential Property 25 years Fixtures, fittings and office equipment 3 years

The Trustees have not provided for depreciation on the residential property, now known as the Old Manse, as they do not consider it appropriate to do so. Given that the residual value is expected to exceed the book cost, any depreciation would be immaterial. This is necessary to show a true and fair view.

Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or, if purchased in the year, the difference between cost and market value at the end of the year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

Taxation

Brightons Parish Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

The purchase of the new Manse was partially funded by a bridging loan from the Church of Scotland which will be repaid when the previous Manse is sold. The old Manse was sold during 2024. Any excess over the current carrying value of £225k will be recognised as a gain on sale Expenditure on charitable activities was £ 175,354 (2023 £525,079); all was unrestricted. During 2022, a new Manse was purchased. In line with other properties occupied by most Church of Scotland General Trustees. As such, the new Manse has not been recognised as a fixed asset within Brightons Parish Church accounts but rather the within the Statement of Financial Activities in the year of sale.
